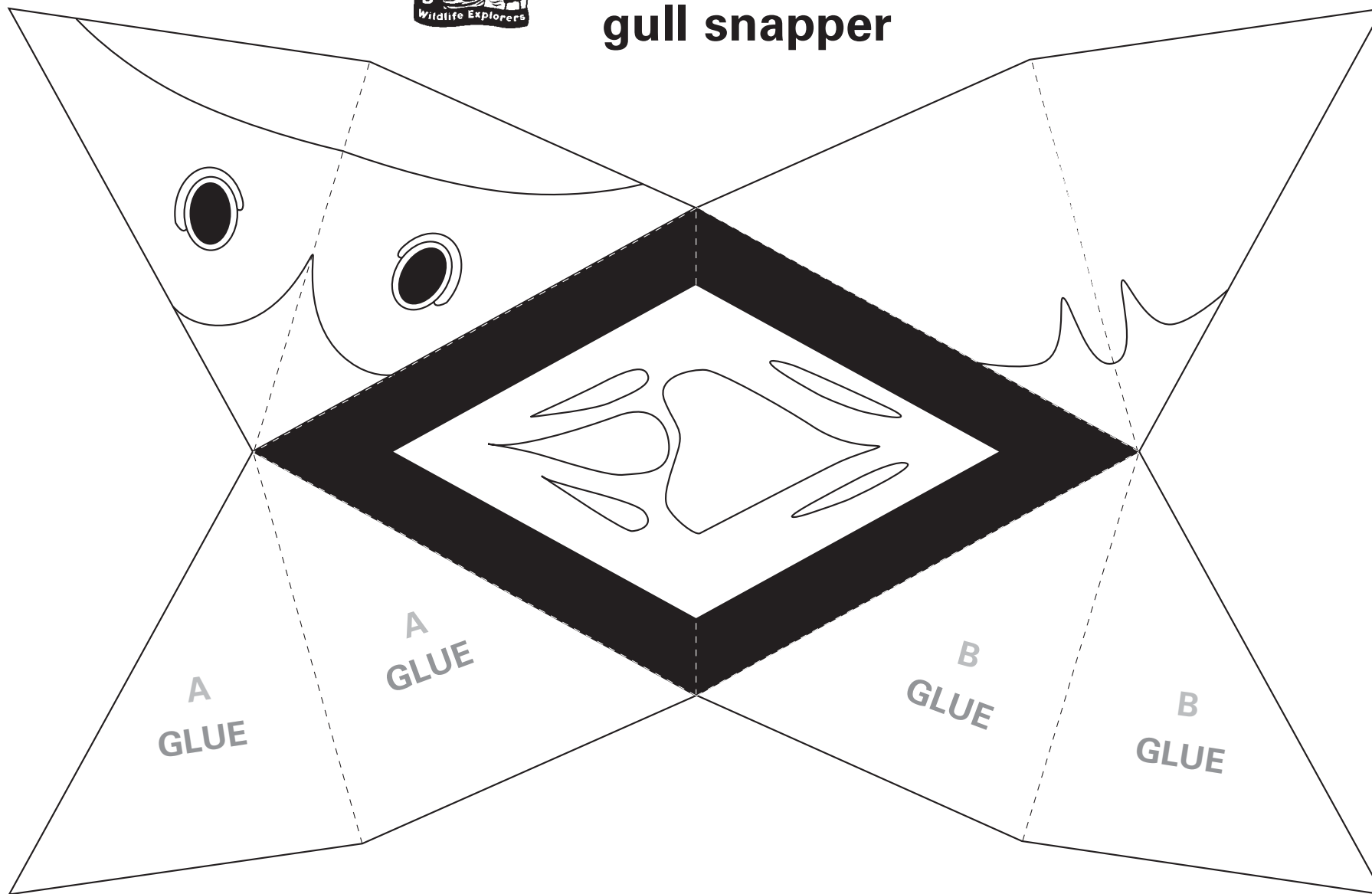




Black-headed gull snapper



You will need:

- scissors
- glue
- brown and red colouring pencils
- double-sided tape.

What to do:

- Colour the head dark brown (make it darker with a black pencil if you can) but leave the back of the neck and the half-circle around the eyes white. Colour the thin ring around each eye, the beak and inside of the mouth dark red.
- Cut all around the outside of the snapper.
- Fold along the dotted lines with the coloured area facing outwards. Make sure you fold across the middle of the mouth too.
- Put glue on the areas marked. Match A and B sections under the head and beak, and squeeze together.
- Inside the top and bottom halves of the beak where circles are marked, stick a little piece of double-sided tape. Put your fingers on the tape and start snapping!

Black-headed gull
Black-headed gulls aren't very well named. Their heads are brown! And in the autumn and winter, the head turns white, with just a black spot on the 'ear' behind each eye. They are very common birds, the red-legged, small, noisy, squabbling gulls of the seaside, fields inland and riversides.

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
