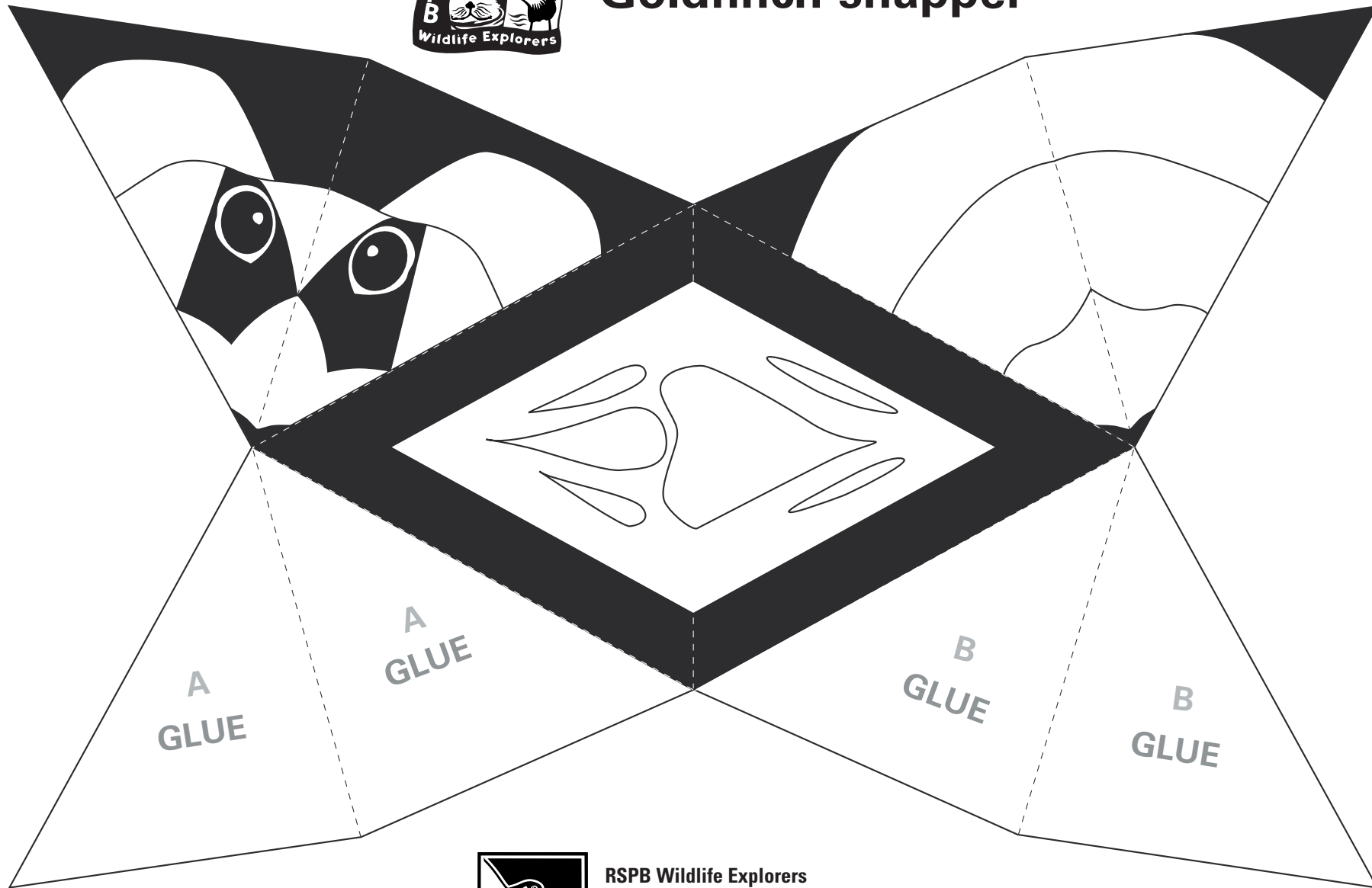




Goldfinch snapper



You will need:

- scissors
- glue
- pink, grey and red colouring pencils
- double-sided tape.

What to do:

- Colour the beak and the circles around the eyes grey. Make the inside of the mouth pink. Colour the shapes next to the eyes, as well as the stripe below the beak, red. Leave the rest of the snapper white.
- Cut out the goldfinch snapper.
- Fold the snapper along the dotted lines with the coloured area facing outwards. Make sure you fold across the middle of the mouth too.
- Apply glue as marked. Match A and B glued sections under the head and beak, squeezing to stick in place.
- Inside both halves of the beak where circles are marked, stick a piece of double-sided tape. Put your fingers on the tape and start snapping!

These birds have long, thin beaks, which allow them to reach the seeds of spiky thistles and teasels without being pricked and hurt. They are called goldfinches because of the bright yellow feathers on their wings.
