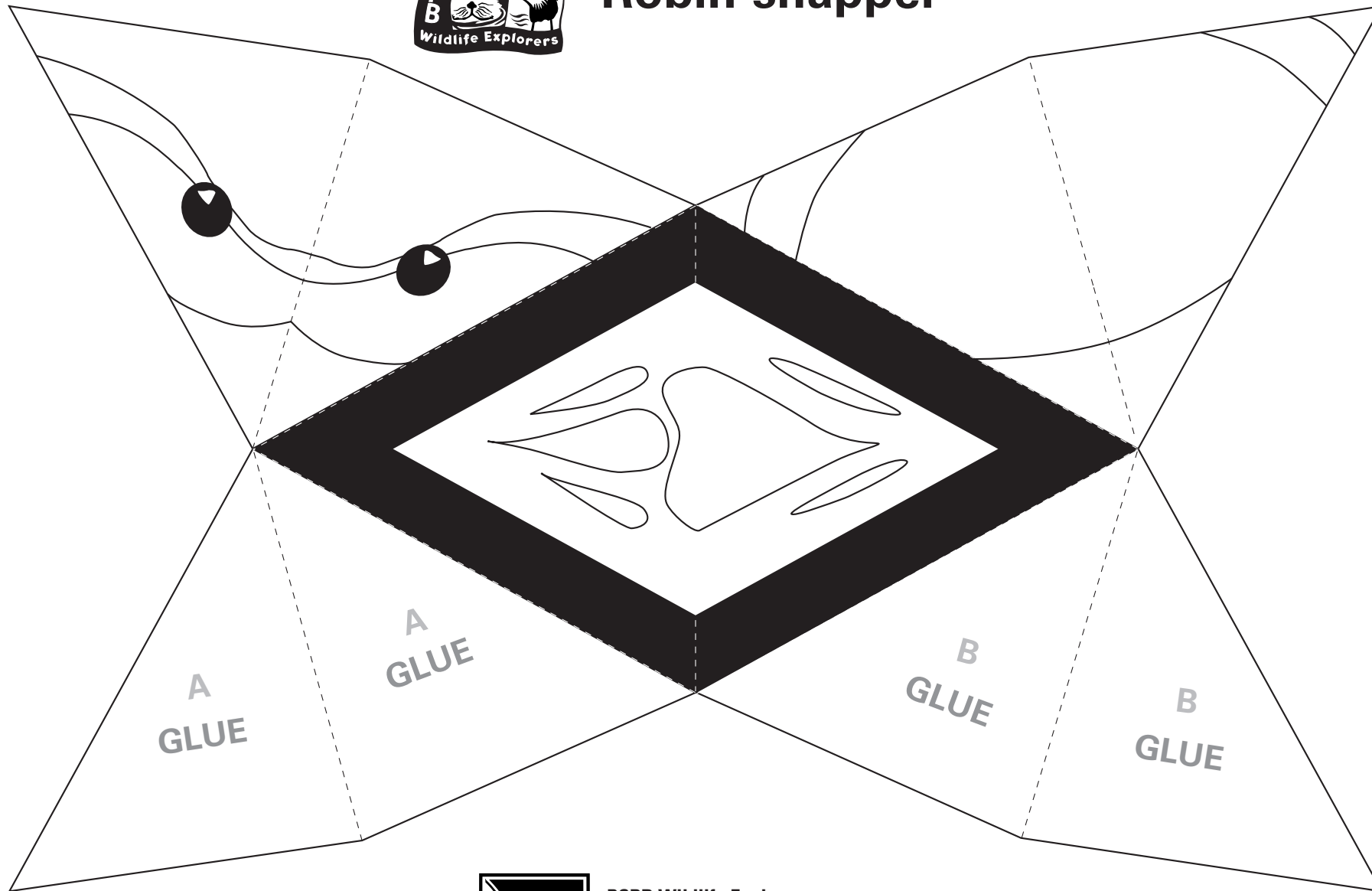




Robin snapper



You will need:

- scissors
- glue
- red, brown, pink and grey colouring pencils
- double-sided tape.

What to do:

- Colour the patch on top of the head, including the small corners on the neck, brown. Make the mouth pink. Colour the beak and the thin stripe on the face and neck grey. Make the rest of the robin red.
- Cut all around the outside of the robin snapper.
- Fold the snapper along the dotted lines with the coloured area facing outwards. Make sure you fold across the middle of the mouth too.
- Apply glue as marked. Match A and B glued sections under the head and beak, squeezing to stick in place.
- Inside the top and bottom halves of the beak where circles are marked, stick a little piece of double-sided tape. Put your fingers on the tape and start snapping!
