## Finding your way around

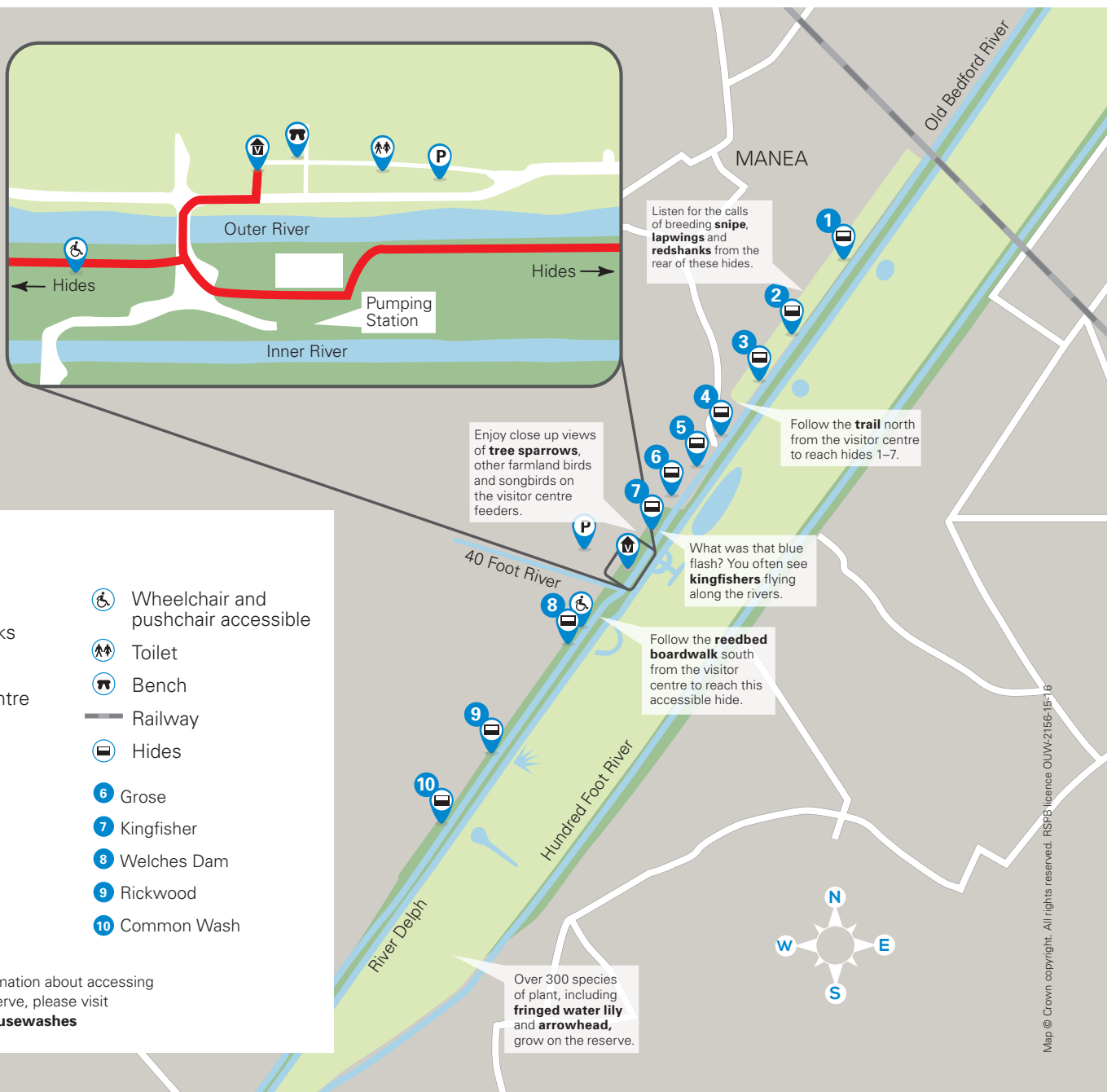
### The hides trail

To discover this special place in all its glory, you need to take a stroll along the trackway that runs parallel to the river bank. To enjoy close-up views of the wildlife here, be sure to step inside some of our hides that overlook the reserve.

Three hides are south of the visitor centre and the furthest, the Common Wash hide, is just over a mile (1.7 km) away. Seven hides are north of the visitor centre – the furthest is Stevens (2 miles / 3.2 km away).

The Welches Dam hide is closest to the visitor centre (0.2 miles / 300 metres) and is accessible by wheelchairs and pushchairs. To reach it, follow the boardwalk that passes through the reedbed – in summer look out for dragonflies.

When the weather is wet, it gets very muddy here, so you may want to wear wellies or waterproof walking boots when exploring the site.
